### **FRIDAY, JUNE 19, 2020**

June 19, known as “Juneteenth” or “Freedom Day,” recognizes June 19, 1865, the date Major General Gordon Granger and his Union soldiers landed in Galveston, TX – two years, six months and 18 days after President Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation - with news that slavery had ended in those states controlled by the Union.

Juneteenth is the oldest celebration commemorating the ending of slavery in the United States, specifically in the former Confederate states.

So, as we honor this day and the freedom it is supposed to represent, we should be mindful that all Americans should take action and work to ensure equality and justice for people of color. Odyssey was founded by members of the Wilmington, DE, chapter of the American Hellenic



Educational Progressive Association (AHEPA). AHEPA was founded in 1922 to fight for civil rights and against discrimination, bigotry, and hatred felt at the hands of the Ku Klux Klan.

As leaders, parents, and educators, we play an important role for our community and our children and we have a duty to speak out against injustices whenever and wherever they may occur. Odyssey is committed to building an inclusive and diverse community. Every student, faculty, and staff member —whatever their race, gender, age, ethnicity, cultural heritage or nationality; religious or political beliefs; sexual orientation or gender identity; or socioeconomic, veteran or ability status—has the right to inclusion, respect, agency and voice in the Odyssey community. Further, all members of the Odyssey community have a responsibility to uphold and promote these values and actively foster full participation in academic and community life.
