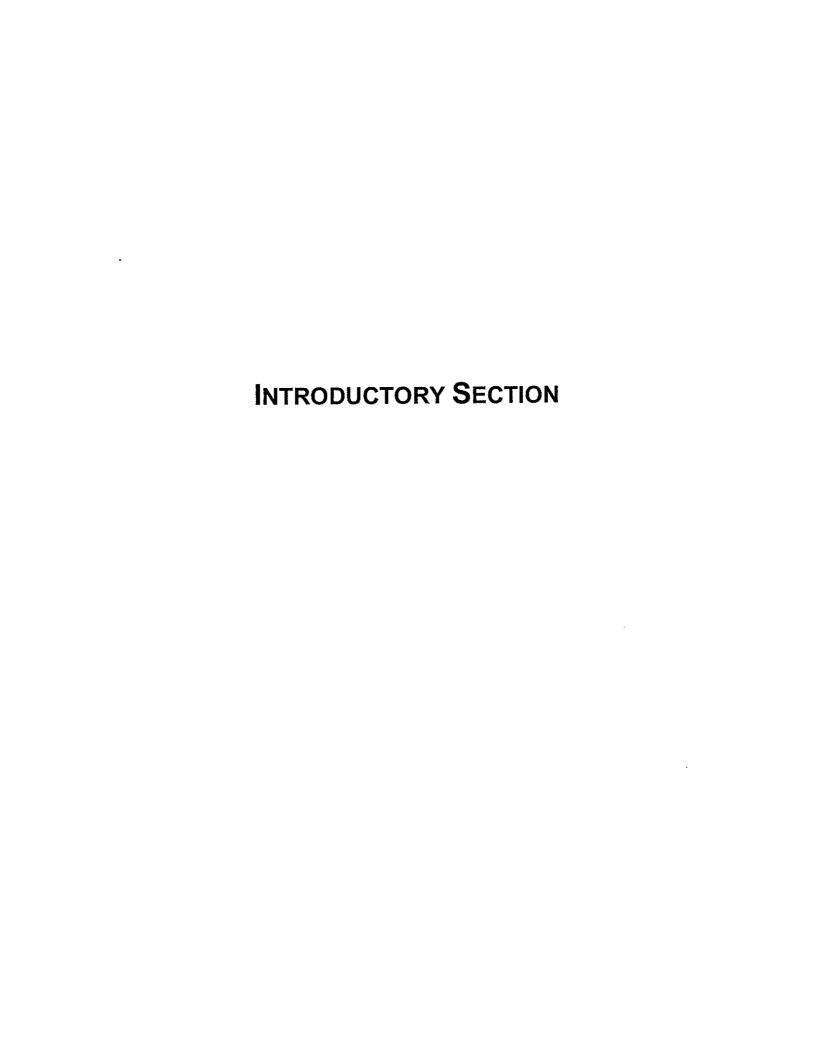

## **Independent Auditors' Report**

To the Board of Directors Odyssey Charter School Wilmington, Delaware

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and the major fund of the Odyssey Charter School (a component unit of the State of Delaware) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2010, which collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Odyssey Charter School's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and the major fund of the Odyssey Charter School as of June 30, 2010, and the changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated November 11, 2010, on our consideration of the Odyssey Charter School's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis on pages 5 through 10 and budgetary comparison information on pages 25 and 26 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS (Unaudited) June 30. 2010

The Board of Directors of the Odyssey Charter School (the "School") are pleased to present to readers of the financial statements of the School this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the School for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2010, its fourth year of operation.

#### FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

#### **Governmental Activities**

• The assets of the School at the close of the fiscal year are \$749,490 (net assets), a decrease of \$24,842 from the previous year.

#### Fund Level

As of the close of the current fiscal year, the School's Governmental Fund (the General Fund) reported
an ending fund balance of \$112,690, a decrease of \$13,161 from the previous year. The entire ending
fund balance is unreserved. It represents 3% of total General Fund expenditures.

#### Long-Term Debt

The School's total debt decreased to \$3,134,491 at June 30, 2010, a decrease of \$29,787. This
decrease represents payments on the long-term debt.

#### OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis is an introduction to the School's basic financial statements. The School's financial statements are comprised of three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

<u>Government-Wide Financial Statements</u>: The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the School's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The Statement of Net Assets (page 11) presents information on all of the School's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net assets. Over time, increases or decreases in net assets may serve as useful indicators as to whether the financial position of the School is improving or deteriorating.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS (Unaudited) June 30, 2010

The Statement of Activities (page 12) presents information showing how the School's net assets changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods.

<u>Fund Financial Statements</u>: The fund financial statements begin on page 13 and provide detailed information about the General Fund. A "fund" is a fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts that the School uses to keep track of specific sources of funding and spending for a particular purpose. The General Fund falls into the governmental category.

• Governmental Funds - The School's basic services are reported in a Governmental Fund, which focuses on how cash flows into and out of the fund and the balances left at year-end that are available for future spending. The Governmental Fund financial statements provide a detailed, short-term view of the School's operations and the services it provides. Governmental Fund information helps to determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the School's programs. Because this information does not encompass the long-term focus of the government-wide statements, reconciliations are provided (page 14) to explain the differences between the Governmental Fund Balance Sheet and the Statement of Net Assets and between the Governmental Fund Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance and the Statement of Activities (page 16). These funds are reported using the modified accrual basis of accounting, which primarily measures cash and other financial assets available to satisfy current liabilities.

**Notes to the Financial Statements**: The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements can be found beginning on page 17 of this report.

<u>Required Supplementary Information</u>: In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report presents certain required supplementary information concerning the School's actual revenues and expenses compared to its budget. The required supplementary information can be found on pages 25 and 26.

The largest component of the School's net assets, \$3,801,104, is reflected as investment in capital assets (e.g., new building, leasehold improvements, equipment and others), less any debt outstanding that was needed to acquire or construct the assets (\$2,822,523). The increase in invested Capital Assets (Net of Related Debt) of \$77,212 is caused primarily by the purchase of equipment for their new facility and acquisition of equipment needed to keep the School in operation. The unrestricted net assets of governmental activities (a deficit) decreased due to the increase in capital assets acquired using the current year change in net assets.

#### FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE SCHOOL'S FUND

As the School completed the fiscal year, its Governmental Fund, the General Fund, reported a fund balance of \$112,690 all of it unreserved.

#### Governmental Fund

#### General Fund - Comparison to Prior Year and to Budget

The General Fund is the School's operating (and only) fund. At the end of the current fiscal year, the unreserved fund balance was \$112,690, a decrease of \$13,161 compared to fiscal year 2009.

#### **GENERAL FUND BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS**

The School adopted the fiscal year 2010 budget in 2009, and did not amend it during the year. The final budget contained \$3,600,400 of revenues and expenditures of \$3,886,122. The actual results were revenues of \$503,247 above budget and expenditures of \$331,415 above budget.

- State support, representing 60% of revenues, was more than the budget by \$31,928 due in part to higher than anticipated enrollment.
- Charges to school districts, representing 28% of revenues, were greater than the budget by \$16,596.
- Instructional services, representing 60% of expenditures, were greater than the budget by \$190,262 due to the need for added student support services (e.g., special education instruction) and to augment foreign language instruction.
- Capital outlays exceeded the budget by \$213,067 due to the purchase of new books, furniture, computers, equipment and leasehold improvements totaling \$277,866.

#### CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

#### Capital Assets

As of June 30, 2010, the School had invested \$3,801,104, net of accumulated depreciation, in its capital assets. The following table presents 2010 asset balances compared to 2009 balances; as further detailed in Note C.

Major capital asset events during the current fiscal year included the following:

• Leasehold improvements and new facility of \$2,858,333 were placed in service. Furniture, equipment and books in the amounts of \$33,466, \$27,611 and \$50,867, respectively, were acquired.

Additional information regarding the School's capital assets is contained in Note C to the financial statements.

#### Long-Term Debt

At the end of the current fiscal year, the School had total debt outstanding of \$3,134,491. Of this amount, \$246,337 is a term loan with a local bank and \$65,591 is an interest-free loan from AHEPA (a related party), the School's non-profit funding organization. Additionally, in 2009, three loans were borrowed to purchase the new building. As of June 30, 2010, the balances on the loans are as follows: term loan with a local bank of \$52,852, a second term with the same bank for \$2,269,671 and a separate purchase money mortgage from the seller of the building for \$500,000.

NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS June 30, 2010

#### NOTE A SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Description of the Charter School

The Odyssey Charter School's (the "School") mission is to prepare students for a lifelong enthusiasm for learning, a keen awareness of world citizenship and an ability to think independently and creatively through participation in a focused foreign language immersion program. The curriculum integrates the learning of a second language, along with the English language, to teach a rigorous curriculum of reading, writing, math, science and social studies. The School currently serves grades K to 5.

The School is organized under Delaware Code, Title 14, Chapter 5 of the State of Delaware. The Charter School Law grants authority for independent public schools to be created for the purpose of increasing choices for parents of public school students and increasing academic performance. A charter school is an independent public school governed by an independent board of directors. In Delaware, charter schools have the same basic standing as a school district with some exceptions--most notably, they may not levy taxes. To encourage innovation, charter schools operate free from a number of state laws and regulations.

Charter schools are funded similarly to other public schools in that state and local funds are allocated for each enrolled student. Public funds are not provided for facilities. Charter schools may charge for selected additional costs consistent with those permitted by other school districts. Because a charter school receives local, state and federal funds, they may not charge tuition.

The School is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been reflected in the School's financial statements.

The financial statements of the School have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applied to local government units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant accounting policies of the School are described below.

#### Reporting Entity

The School, which opened in September 2006, was established to provide a unique learning environment to students. The School is considered to be a component unit of the State of Delaware. A component unit, although a legally separate entity, is, in substance, part of the State of Delaware's (the "State") operations. The School has no component units for which it is considered to be financially accountable.

NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS June 30, 2010

#### Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net assets and the statement of activities) report information on all of the non-fiduciary activities of the School.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given program are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific program. Program revenues include (1) charges to students who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods and services provided and (2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function. Grants and other revenues not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Separate financial statements are provided for the Governmental Fund.

## Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Preparation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Charges to school districts are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are billed. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

The Governmental Fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the School considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures are recorded only when payment is due.

The School reports the following major Governmental Fund:

• The General Fund is the School's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the School, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Except for the fund-raising cash account, cash and cash equivalents of the School are controlled by the State Treasurer's Office in Dover, Delaware. The fund-raising cash account is controlled by the School.

NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS June 30, 2010

#### Capital Assets

The cost of normal repairs and maintenance that does not add to the value of the asset or materially extend the life of the asset is not capitalized.

Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed.

For leasehold improvements acquired in connection with the operating lease on the school building, the amortization period is the shorter of the useful life of the leasehold improvement or the lease term (including reasonably assured renewal periods), which is 22 years.

For office and school furniture, the useful life is five years.

For books and educational materials, the useful life is three years.

All assets are depreciated using the straight-line method and a half-year convention.

#### Compensated Absences

Vacation and sick pay plus related payroll taxes are accrued when earned in the government-wide financial statements.

**Vacation** - Vacation must be taken and cannot be accumulated from year to year. Employees are paid for unused vacation upon termination, retirement, etc., at the current rate of pay.

Sick Leave - Sick leave allowances cannot be accumulated from year to year.

There were no compensated absences as of June 30, 2010.

#### Fund Balance

In the fund financial statements, the Governmental Fund reports reservations of fund balance for amounts that are not available for appropriation or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a restricted purpose.

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTES TO THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS June 30, 2010

#### NOTE B CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

At June 30, 2010, the School has a cash and cash equivalents balance of \$476,734. Of that amount, \$430,376 is part of an investment pool controlled by the personnel of the State Treasurer's Office in Dover, Delaware. All investment decisions are made by the State Treasurer's Office. These funds are considered to be highly liquid and available for immediate use and, thus, are recorded as cash equivalents in these financial statements.

The funds held by the State investment pool, an internal investment pool, are specifically identified for the School, but the credit risk cannot be categorized for these funds. Credit risk for such investments depends on the financial stability of the State. The State reports that its investment securities are stated at quoted market prices, except that investment securities with a remaining maturity at time of purchase of one year or less are stated at cost or amortized cost.

The bank balance of cash deposits is insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), and, therefore, there is no custodial credit risk for these cash deposits.

#### NOTE C CAPITAL ASSETS

#### NOTE D LEASING ARRANGEMENTS

#### NOTE E PENSION PLAN

School employees are considered State employees and are covered under the State's pension program. The State contributed 15.27% for fiscal 2010 of the State's share of the employees' salaries. The School contributed the same percentage on the local share of the salary. The employees contribute 3% of salary in excess of \$6,000. The School's contribution was \$192,633.

#### NOTE F COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

In the normal course of business, there are various outstanding commitments and contingent liabilities in addition to the normal encumbrances for the purchase of goods and services. The School does not anticipate losses from these transactions.

#### Grants

The School receives financial assistance from federal agencies in the form of grants. The disbursement of funds received under these programs generally requires compliance with terms and conditions specified in the grant agreements and is subject to audit. Any disallowed claims resulting from such audits could become a liability of the School. The School's administration believes such disallowance, if any, would be immaterial.

#### NOTE G RISK MANAGEMENT

The School has purchased commercial insurance policies for various risks of loss related to torts; theft, damage, or destruction of assets; errors or omissions; injuries to employees; or acts of God. Payments of premiums for these policies are recorded as expenses of the School. Insurance settlements have not exceeded insurance coverage in either of the past two years. There were no significant reductions in coverage compared to the prior year.

#### NOTE H DONATED SERVICES

The School received volunteer services from a Board member who served as the office administrator. For fiscal year 2010, the estimated fair market value of the donated service was \$40,000.

The School also received instructional services from Greek teachers. These services were paid by the Embassy of Greece. For fiscal year 2010, the estimated fair market value of the donated service was \$245,000.

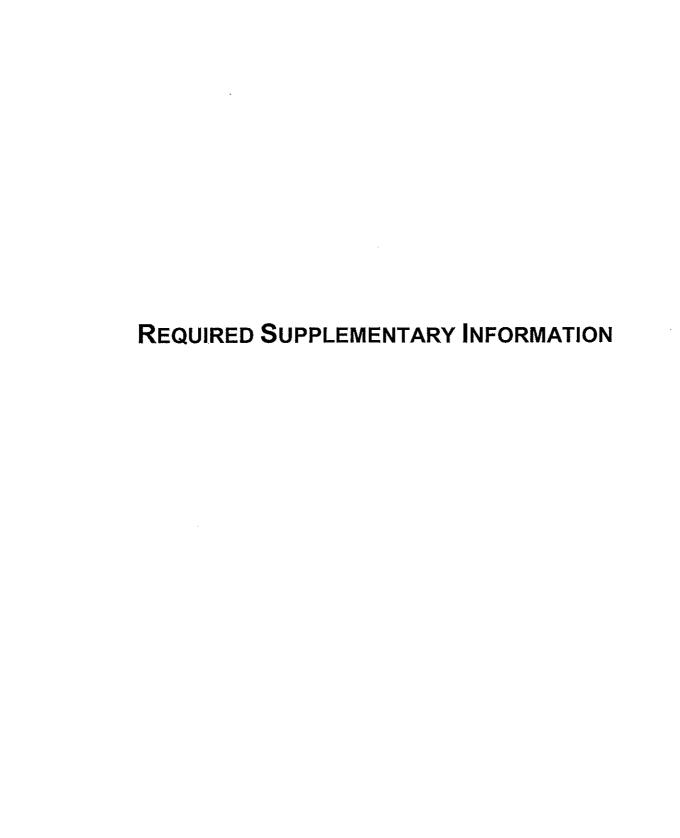
#### NOTE J RELATED-PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The School has entered into a loan agreement with a nonprofit organization. Members of the Board of Directors of the School are also members of the governing body of the nonprofit organization.

#### NOTE K FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS (SWAP)

The School has entered into an interest rate swap related to its \$2,280,000 variable-rate loan as a means to lower interest costs. The objective of the swap is to change the School's variable-rate loan to a synthetic fixed rate of 5.90%. The loan matures in March 2019, and the swap agreement matures in March 2014. The swap agreement's original notional amount of \$2,280,000 was equal to the principal amount of the loan issued. The notional amount of the swap has declined as loan principal payments have been made and will continue to decline as the principal amount of the associated loan declines. Under the terms of the swap, the School pays the counterparty a fixed payment of 5.90% and receives a variable payment calculated as prime plus 50 basis points. Because interest rates have declined since execution of the swap, the swap had a negative fair value of \$95,404 as of June 30, 2010.

The School adopted GASB Statement No. 53, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Derivative Instruments. All derivatives included in the scope of GASB Statement No. 53 are required to be reported at their fair value, with the exception of fully benefit-responsive synthetic guaranteed investment contracts. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2010, the School reported a decrease in fair market value of the swap as a deferred outflow in the statement of net assets and interest on long-term debt in the statement of activities. The fair value of the swap was obtained from pricing service at its mid-market values.

#### NOTE A BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The School's budget is prepared on the cash basis of accounting. The amount reported as "net change in fund balance" on the budgetary basis derives from the cash basis of accounting. Revenues are reported when received and expenditures are reported when paid. This amount differs from the "net change in fund balance" reported on the statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balance, Governmental Fund on page 15.

That statement is prepared on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the School considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting.

The following reconciles the net change in fund balance per the budgetary basis to the net change in fund balance per the modified accrual basis.

#### **COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS**

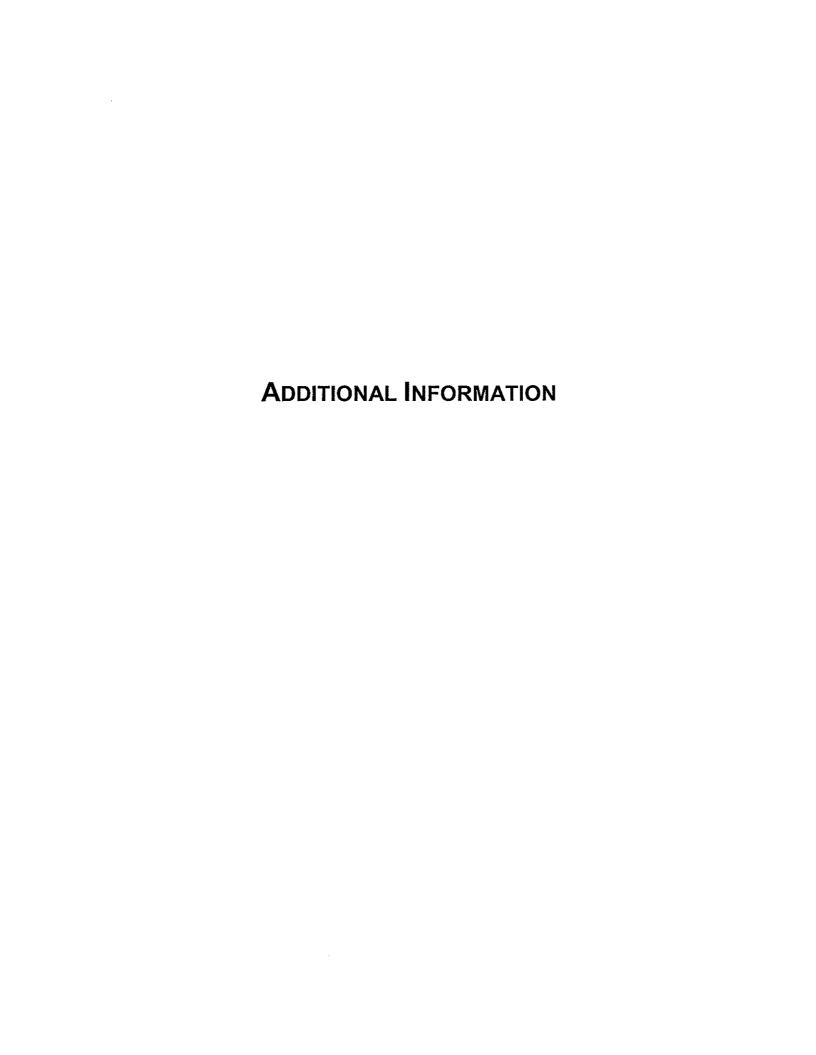

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AUDIT

## 09-01 Accrual Accounting

**Condition**: The School did not prepare all necessary year-end journal entries to convert its books and records from the cash basis to the accrual basis.

**Recommendation**: We recommend the School develop the necessary workpapers to support the year-end conversion to the accrual basis and then record the appropriate entries.

**Response**: We concur that the School should develop the necessary procedures to support the year-end conversion to the accrual basis and record the appropriate entries. The Business Manager will establish these procedures as discussed during the audit.

**Current Status**: The School has addressed the issue and has prepared all necessary year-end journal entries to convert to the accrual basis. This finding is no longer applicable for the current year.

## 09-02 Segregation of Duties

**Condition**: We noted the following incompatible duties:

- The employee responsible for handling and depositing cash receipts also reconciles the bank accounts, posts to the cash receipts and maintains the accounts receivable subsidiary records.
- The individual who is responsible for setting up new employees in the payroll system, inputting
  hourly data for part-time employees and initiating the payroll process also maintains the general
  ledger.
- The same individual who is responsible for posting cash receipts and disbursements also prepares the bank reconciliations.

#### Recommendation: We recommend:

- A separate individual be assigned the duty of opening the business office mail. That individual could then make a listing or copy of all payments received for later comparison to the bank statement.
- An independent person reviews the biweekly payroll reports for accuracy. That individual should initial the reports to document the review process.
- An independent person reviews the monthly bank reconciliations for unusual items. That
  person should also scan the canceled checks and compare the deposit to the listing or copies
  made as indicated above.

SCHEDULE OF PRIOR AUDIT FINDINGS Year Ended June 30, 2010

#### Response:

- Due to the limited number of administrative employees at the School, it would be difficult for the School secretary to open all of the business mail. The School does not normally receive payments through the mail, only bills. However, starting this year, any payments from parents for the "Before and After Care" program are received by the secretary. She records the payments, copies the checks and turns them over to the Business Office for processing.
- We concur that the biweekly payroll should be reviewed for accuracy by an independent person.
   This will be accomplished by having the Headmaster review the "Payroll Authorization" form prior to the Business Manager forwarding to the State for each paycheck.
- We concur that the monthly bank reconciliation should be reviewed for unusual items such as canceled checks and deposits and should be compared to copied checks and bank statements.

**Current Status**: The School has implemented procedures to provide for adequate segregation of duties. This finding is no longer applicable for the current year.

#### 09-03 Maintain Fixed Asset Records

**Condition**: The School does not maintain a detailed listing of fixed assets and does not reconcile these records to the general ledger on a timely basis.

**Recommendation**: We recommend detailed fixed asset records be kept and maintained on a timely basis.

**Response**: We concur that detailed fixed asset records be kept and maintained on a timely basis. At this time, the Board Treasurer maintains these records for the School.

**Current Status**: The School maintains detailed listings of fixed assets and reconciles to the general ledger. This finding is no longer applicable for the current year.
